Syllabus, TA 584: Asian Theatre

Course Description. An in-depth study of the major forms and styles of traditional and contemporary theatre and dance in India, China, Japan, and southeast Asia.

Learning Outcomes. Upon completion of the course, 1. Students will be able to identify and discuss the forms and styles of traditional and contemporary Asian theatre practices, including but not limited to Sanskrit drama, Beijing Opera, Noh, Kabuki, Bunraku, and Indonesian puppet theatre.
2. Students will have received practice and instruction in presenting research presentations on a topic related to Asian theatre; they will be equipped to share their research confidently in advanced studies.
3. Students will have received practice and instruction in writing research on Asian theatre.
4. Students will have a foundation with which they may pursue advanced studies in Asian theatre.
