TA 274 World Theatre IV Required Narrative

a. How the course addresses the learning outcomes of one of the four areas of General Education:

Students will demonstrate an understanding of and ability to employ the processes of intellectual inquiry in the humanities by engaging in a multicultural and transnational examination of the history, theory, dramatic literature and practices of theatre from around 1950 c.e. to present day. Students will participate in class discussions, actively engage in a group project wherein they will read and research a play from Europe, Asia, Africa and the Americas during the designated period in order to facilitate a discussion of the play by the entire class, present an oral report on a broad topic of theatre history and identify a topic or problem and write a paper on a significant moment, participant or trend in world theatre using (after evaluating) a variety of reference sources in order to offer up a comment or potential solution to the identified problem relying on sound evidence and reasoning.

b. How the course addresses the learning outcomes identified in the appropriate course template:

Learning Outcome #1,#4 & #5: In class, students will be required to present an oral report on a significant moment, participant or trend in world theatre that will be assigned to them in order to research and identify differing interpretations. Subsequently, each student will be required to identify a topic or problem derived from the broad research presented in the oral report and continue to research the more narrowly defined topic or problem leading to the drafting and writing of a research paper (relying on primary and secondary sources, scholarly publications and legitimate internet sites) that conforms with MLA Style guidelines.

Learning Outcome #2: After reading the requisite course materials and participating in discussions instigated by the instructor during class lectures, in a midterm examination and a final examination, students will have to demonstrate their ability to distinguish different artistic and historical periods, participants and trends in World Theatre from theatre of the absurd, existentialism, African-America, Latino, Gay & Lesbian to postmodern theatre from 1950 c.e. to the present day.

Learning Outcome #3: By studying the plays, actors, designers and theorists of Europe, Asia, Africa and the Americas students will be able to identify and distinguish the values and world-views of the people of these different cultures during the period 1950 c.e. to the present day. Students will read plays, examine theatre design and architecture, costumes and acting styles from the various periods and cultures, developing an ability to analyze and interpret the works.

c. Evidence of active engagement of students in the course:

In addition to the oral presentations and research and writing of a research paper, students will be required to participate in classroom discussions based on the required reading and students will be required to participate in at least one group assignment with 3 or 4 peers wherein the group will read, research and explore one assigned play from the cultures/periods outside of the classroom and then subsequently facilitate the discussion of

the assigned play in the classroom with all the students of the course.

d. General description of the type of assignment(s) that can be extracted from the course for assessment of the General Education program:

The midterm and final examinations that will be based on all lectures, texts, handouts and other subject matter (including, but not limited to, videos, slides, models, play productions will be comprised of short answer questions (70%) and an essay (30%). These exams and the 5 page research papers (MLA Style) can be easily extracted for assessment.

COURSE SUMMARY & GOALS

A multicultural and transnational examination of the history, theory, dramatic literature and practices of theatre from around 1950 to the present day. The fourth of four courses in a four semester sequence of world theatre. Reading plays and texts, participating in class discussions and researching theater history concerning this particular chronological period will give students a broader understanding of world theatre.

LEARNING EXPECTATIONS

By the end of this course, each student should be able to:

Identify and describe key theater artists (playwrights, actors, directors, designers, theorists) and significant historical moments in theater, culture and politics for each period covered;

Discuss and analyze Aristotle's 6 elements of drama for each play reviewed in class;

And each student will have:

Researched and written a paper on one significant moment, participant or trend in world theatre;
and

Facilitated a class discussion of a contemporary play.

All students are expected to read the text and/or plays assigned for each class. In class, the instructor will offer a lecture on the particular subject for the day and facilitate a discussion (which may include calling on students) of the material and subject matter.

ASSIGNMENTS:

MIDTERM EXAM (40%)

In class on Tuesday, October 20, 2009, covering all lectures, texts, handouts and other subject matter (including, but not limited to, videos, slides, models, play productions) for the period August 27 to October 20, 2009. The exam will be comprised of short answer questions (70%) and an essay (30%).

FACILITATOR (5%)

Each student will work in a group with other students and be responsible for facilitating a discussion of one play. Creativity will be rewarded.

RESEARCH PAPER (15%)

Each student will identify an individual world theatre research topic. The student will conduct research on the topic and present the results of his/her research, including a thesis statement, to the instructor on a date to be assigned (around the midterm). After consultation with the instructor the student will conduct further research and write a 5 page Paper (MLA style) to be submitted to the instructor (in his Theatre Department mailbox) no later than Friday, December 4, 2009.

FINAL EXAM (40%)

On Thursday, December 17, 2009 at 10:30am, covering all lectures, texts, handouts and other subject matter (including, but not limited to, videos, slides, models, play productions) for the period October 20, 2009 to December 10, 2009. The exam will be comprised of short answer questions (70%) and an essay (30%).
