Chair Bill Fortune called the meeting to order

A correction was noted in the January 14 Senate minutes: Bret Ripley should be listed as absent but excused. There being no further corrections, the minutes were approved as distributed.

The Chair announced the following rule waivers:

- 1) The Rules committee recently interpreted Rule 5.3.1.5 to require 12 graded credit hours in order to take bankruptcy. The Senate Council waived the rule, as interpreted, to allow a student with 9 graded hours and 3 pass hours to take bankruptcy.
- 2) At the request of the College, The Senate Council waived the time requirement of Rule 5.1.3.2 for completion of a course for which an I grade had been assigned.
- 3) The Senate Council waived the requirement of Rule 1.4.1 that requires committee chairs to be Senators to allow two non-Senator chairs to continue in their roles.

Senate Committee Reports

<u>Rules and Election Committee</u>: Chair Brad Canon reported that Ernie Bailey had been elected to the Senate Council, defeating Kaveh Tagavi by a very narrow margin.

<u>Academic Planning Committee</u>: Chair Andy Spears announced that the meeting with the architects had been re-scheduled: February 20 from 2-4 in the College of Law Courtroom.

Memorials:

Dean David Mohney read a memorial to Charles Graves, formerly Dean of the College of Architecture. A moment of silence followed.

Action Items

- 1) The University calendars for 2002--2003, 2003-2004, and 2004-2005 were approved as posted on the Senate Council web site.
- 2) Dean David Johnson moved the approval of <u>Item A</u>: suspension of the provision in Senate Rule 4.2.2.13 which fixes the gpa at 2.6 for admission to the four undergraduate programs of the College of Communications and Information Sciences to allow the College to impose a 3.0 gpa requirement for the 2002-03 academic year. In so moving Dean Johnson noted the following editorial changes: the College is the College of Communications and Information Science, and the programs are Communications, Integrated Strategic Communication, Journalism, and Telecommunications. The motion was seconded by Enid Waldhart. After discussion the motion was defeated on a hand count: 39-31.

Presentations

- 1) Phyllis Nash presented the preliminary report of the Top 20 committee, and took questions and comments from the audience.
- 2) Kristina Krampe presented a report on the Engaging Differences project -- the informative web site to answer the questions of faculty about relating to students with disabilities.

The College of Architecture mourns the passing of its founding Dean, Charles Parker Graves Jr.

Chuck Graves was 31 years old when he came to Lexington as the head of a new program in architecture. The year was 1958, and architecture had existed as a loosely defined area of concentration in the Department of Civil Engineering for several decades. The program's advance was swift, guided by the efforts of Dean Graves. By 1965, the program had achieved its present status as a college at the university. In the same year, professional accreditation was granted, and the first class graduated. His aspirations were high from the start of the program, and they never faltered.

Under Dean Graves' leadership, the College was recognized nationally for its efforts in Kentucky. In 1962, he worked with Grady Clay and others to develop a proposal for a New Town in Appalachia, a proposal that was singled out for recognition by then-governor Bert Combs. In the late 1960s, he forged an alliance with the Yale University School of Architecture, initiating a series of building projects in eastern Kentucky involving Yale and Kentucky students working together. This effort, in part, facilitated the establishment of Appalshop in Whitesburg, Kentucky. He was involved with the first efforts to restore the Shaker settlement at Pleasant Hill, and served as an advisor to Cincinnati on its master planning efforts. Dean Graves believed strongly in the value of international education. Accordingly, he began one of the first international programs for architecture students when he set up an atelier in Venice, Italy. That program continues to this day. Prominent among architectural educators, Chuck made sure these accomplishments were known at a national level, and many projects served as models for similar efforts at other schools of architecture.

Born and raised in Kansas City, trained as an architect at the University of Pennsylvania when it was one of the pre-eminent programs in the country, Dean Graves taught at Clemson and Georgia Tech before arriving at the University of Kentucky. He also did a stint in the Marines near the end of the Korean War, where his drawing abilities were immediately recognized and he became a staff artist for the military magazine.

When he stepped down as Dean in 1972 after fourteen years (and at the ripe old age of just 45!), Dean Graves stayed in Lexington, and continued to teach at the College of Architecture. He established a series of professional partnerships, and carried out a number of notable building projects in central Kentucky. He remained a fixture in professional organizations nationally, and served as a consultant to the United States Department of State on the design of embassies around the world.

Best of all, though, from his point of view, he had time to immerse himself in his teaching, and it was the students who benefited from this. Part of his ability as an educator came from his willingness to inject a social dimension into everything that he did. For his students, it meant the tradition of a day at Keeneland, where he bought everyone an admission ticket and one beer, and required all the students to dress up, including ties for

the men. It wasn't an idle day-off for Chuck; instead he was inculcating the values of human interaction among his students, encouraging them to stretch themselves socially as well as intellectually. Dean Graves understood that the two were intractably linked. Indeed for him, it was a way of life. Noted urban affairs critic Grady Clay remembers a discussion with the Dean at Penn about the time Chuck Graves had been a student there. "I recall Chuck Graves well," said Dean G. Holmes Perkins. "Regardless of whether his team won the class competitions, they always had more fun than any other team."

A fellow Dean from the 1960s remembered the unofficial Deans of Architecture Club Chuck established for his peers, and how he would entertain them during annual visits to Lexington (always during the Keeneland meet, by the way): "The meeting was agenda-less, supposedly social. Older deans in a corner instructed younger deans and vice versa. We went to the races. We ate, we drank and it was probably the most productive gathering in the annals of architecture..."

The social graces Chuck cultivated extended much further, of course. They set the tone for interaction within the College of Architecture. To this day, I believe that a high and somewhat rare degree of collegiality among faculty within the College derives from the climate that Dean Graves did so much to instill. Especially from the administrative side, it is my view that this is one of those intangible, yet essential, components in advancing the cause of education, in striving to reach those high aspirations. It is not only a worthy goal; it is, in the words of Dean Perkins, "fun" as well.

Near the end of the Korean War, young Chuck Graves hitched a ride home on a military bomber. The only open seat was the bombardier's glass compartment on the belly of the plane, and it was damaged; portions of its glazing were cracked and missing. The flight path took them from a base near Washington to Kansas City directly over Kentucky at night. And as Dean Graves told the story, he looked down on a beautiful Kentucky landscape of rolling hills lit by moonlight and an occasional farm light, with cold wind pouring past him through the gaps in the plane, and thought to himself what a remarkable country this was, with so many resources, and how anything was possible.

On behalf of the alumni, students, staff and faculty of the College of Architecture, I am honored that Dean Emeritus Charles Parker Graves chose to prove that anything was possible here in Kentucky. We are all the better for it.

Item A

<u>Action Item</u>: Proposal from the College of Communications to raise the undergraduate grade point average required for admission to its four undergraduate programs (Communications, General Editorial, Advertising and Telecommunications) from 2.6 to 3.0 for the 2002-03 year only. This proposal would "waive" (or suspend) the current provisions in Senate Rule

4.2.2.13 which now describe the minimum gpa as a 2.6 and say that "[a]ssuming all else is in order, applicants with a 2.60 undergraduate grade point average will be accepted."

This waiver (or suspension) would be in effect only for the 2002-03 academic year. The College has submitted a proposal for a rule change to the Senate Council for consideration by the Senate Committee on Admissions and Academic Standards, but it is impossible to give due consideration to a proposed rule change in time for new requirements to be printed in the Bulletin. Hence, it is necessary to deal with this issue as a proposal to waive (or suspend) the rule.

The Senate Council forwards this proposal to the Senate without recommendation.

<u>Background</u>: In 1987, at the request of the College, the Senate amended the rules to provide for selective admission (the present 2.6) into the College's programs. Though the minutes of the Senate meeting are not clear, the Senate apparently also passed a provision to allow the College faculty to change the minimum gpa on a year to year basis with notice to deans and directors and approval by the Senate Council. This portion of the proposal was not made part of the rules, and the present Senate Council Chair (and, with one exception, the other members of the Council) was unaware of its existence until earlier this month.

There is no question, however, but that the College has relied in good faith on this provision, which appears in the Bulletin, in seeking to raise its gpa for the 2002-03 year. The Dean notified other deans and requested the Senate Council to approve the 3.0 standard. The Chair informed the Dean that he would place the matter on the Senate Council agenda for the 28th, but that he was opposed to the Senate Council approving changes in admission requirements to Colleges.

At its January 28 meeting, the Council voted to send the matter to the Senate for action with no recommendation. The Council believes this is a matter with campus wide impact and should not be approved by the executive body. By majority vote, the Council declined to take a position on the proposal, feeling that it lacked sufficient input from affected persons to do so.

<u>Implementation</u>: Effective for the 2002-2003 academic year only.
