The SAASC convened on Friday, April 20, 2018 to consider a proposal from the College of Design, Department of Interiors: Planning/Strategy/Design involving a change of total credit hours from 132 to 128.

Attendance: Dan Morey, David Hulse, Fred Danner, Kevin Donohue, Brad Kerns, Rebecca Kellum, Brad Hubbard, Shawn Caudill, Herman Farrell (Chair)

Procedure:

Dan Morey acted as facilitator of the proposal.

Discussion:

This change involved the reduction of the total credit hours from 132 to 128. That change involved the removal of 4 courses, the reduction in credit hours of another course from 5 to 4 credit hours, a new sequencing of courses, moving one course in a sequence from 2<sup>nd</sup> to 3<sup>rd</sup> year, the addition of a capstone course in the 4<sup>th</sup> year, a reorganization and expansion of the existing Professional Practice sequence, including the addition of a new course and the addition of one Directed Elective Course. A few editing issues were discussed and a request was made for a statement of the learning outcomes as well as a letter from the chair of another effected unit. Those documents were retrieved and are attached.

Vote:

A motion was made and seconded that the SAASC approve the proposal from the College of Design, Department of Interiors: Planning/Strategy/Design involving a change of total credit hours from 132 to 128.

The committee voted 9 in favor, 0 opposed.

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**2. Overview of Changes**

2a	Describe the rationale for the changes, including results from the most recent program review if applicable. (450 word limit)
	Changes in the curriculum in the School of Interiors meet two goals: (1) to create a more effective re-organization of course content and (2) to add new content across the curriculum to reflect changes occurring in the professional practice of interior design which will prepare students for the broader range of increased job options and opportunities in the interiors and related building industries. Specific changes include: the removal of 4 courses where the content is integrated in other courses within the curriculum (ID263, ID264, ID375, ARC111); reduction in credit hours of Interiors Studio courses from 5 credits to 4 credits; a new sequence of Design Communication courses (2 credits each) offered concurrently with studio to promote a more robust communications curriculum; reorganization of four Systems and Materials courses with a change in their sequence; moving Environmental Theory from second year to third year; adding a new course, ID 461 Capstone Theory and Research to the fourth year; a re-organization and expansion of the existing Professional Practice sequence including the addition of one new course, ID 372; and the addition of one Directed Elective course. Total credit hours changes from 132 to 128.

## **SOI DIRECTED ELECTIVES : NOVEMBER 2017**

Directed electives in the School of Interiors represent an opportunity for each student to establish a focus of study to augment required studio courses and lecture classes. In recognizing the breadth and diversity of approaches to design, the faculty of the School recognize that through this requirement students might engage in an academic minor or a certificate program offered at the University.

After consulting with a faculty mentor, each student must submit a plan for his/her 21 credit hour directed elective requirement in the Office of Student Services in the College of Design for approval by the Director of the School. While it can be amended, students must complete the plan by the end of their fourth semester in the program.

- 6.2.1 When will data be collected for each outcome? At the end of each academic semester.
- 6.2.2 How will data be collected for each outcome? For every project or assignment in every course, faculty selects three examples of student work. In aggregate, this work is stored online in a drive separated by course number and section.
- 6.2.3 What will be the benchmark/target for each outcome? Following the rating system in the accreditation process for the program, faculty assesses student work using the following rating scale: 3 (excellent), 2 (average) and 1 (below average).
- 6.2.4 What individuals/groups will be responsible for data collection? Sabrina Brewer, Patrick Lee Lucas and the Interiors Faculty.

## **7 Assessment Cycle and Data Analysis**

- 7.2 Assessment Cycle (1-3 years): Artifacts will be evaluated in May of each year by the faculty based on the rubric in Appendix A. Results will be analyzed and interpreted by the director in the summer of each year in August for review and comment. The SLO report will then be finalized and submitted to the University's assessment office no later than October 31<sup>st</sup>.
- 7.3 Data Analysis/Procedures: Where faculty determine student learning outcomes do not meet the CIDA standards, the faculty will develop implementation plan to correct the deficiencies by the next cycle of review thus the data collected assist with timely annual review of accreditation standards to improve the program.
- 7.4 Data Analysis Report Process/Procedures [Unit report structure; College and Institutional report structure; Integration with Program Review; Integration with Strategic Planning process]: The director will share the program assessment results with the Associate Dean of Administration, and the college curriculum committee to integrate assessment with strategic planning.
